Volunteers Needed!

There was no fancy ribbon-cutting ceremony and no dignitaries were present (unless you count the 3 hard-working members of the Wolverine football team,) when Habitat broke ground October 9th for the next three Habitat houses.

Build Chair Jerry Dorsey marshaled his team of enthusiastic volunteers -- Board members, students, neighbors and the families who will buy these houses -- to take pick and shovel in hand to dig foundations. Habitat is putting out the call for volunteers to help build the first three of seven "simple, affordable" homes. Interested volunteers not already signed up from earlier builds please contact Habitat's Volunteer Coordinator, Pat McKeever at 961-0775. (Contractors willing to provide some supervision are of special interest, but no one will be turned away.)

When these three houses are completed in Spring 2005, Habitat will begin work on the next four City-approved houses.



TO BUILD IS TO SPEND----HABITAT NEEDS YOUR HELP MORE THAN EVER.

Now that Dana Street is underway, the season of saving for the future is over; the future is now. For several years you have given us the means to prepare the way for Dana-surveys, hearings, engineering and plans-now we need your help for the part that counts, housing our Partner families.

The houses we began on October 9th will cost 50% more to build than the same homes in 2000-2001-heated housing markets and the war have doubled many prices like copper, steel and plywood. We are funded for the 2 homes under way and the 3rd we are starting this Winter, but we need to prepare for the next 2 starts in Spring and the purchase of new land for the future.

The cost of land in Fort Bragg has doubled since we purchased the 1.75 acres on Dana; another developed parcel of similar size will cost close to \$1,000,000. Thanks to an anonymous donor, we have the first \$150,000 towards that acquisition; the rest as always will depend on your generosity.

Many of you have already contributed and some have increased the amount and frequency of your gifts-few non-profits can claim this in a weak economy and we treasure your loyalty. Keep us in mind for Holiday gift contributions honoring friends and family!



FAMILY SELECTION UPDATE BY KENT BROWN, CHAIR

We are now processing all applications for completeness, verifying credit information, and rental history. These qualified applications will go to the whole committee after the Holidays for preliminary deliberations. The Committee will select eight

finalists for submittal to the Board at their April meeting. This will be a fairly straight forward task for them, since the committee will present eight equally qualified finalists. The Board will be given eight sealed envelopes from which to choose four. These four will sign a Covenant with Habitat and begin their Sweat Equity hours on Dana Street.

We had 97 requests for applications prior to any public notifications. (This level of interest shows the scope of the housing need on the Coast, as our last round in 2000 had 71

We sent brochures to all interested families, providing basic information for them to self-qualify their basic eligibility before obtaining an actual application by phone.

Habitat accepts applications from all people regardless of ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation or religious preference, and chooses finalists based on need and willingness to commit to Habitat's mission and methods. With so many in such great need, our task is a painful and sometimes tearful one, but joyous in the outcome.

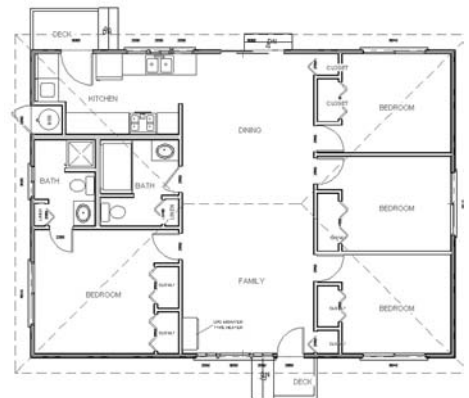
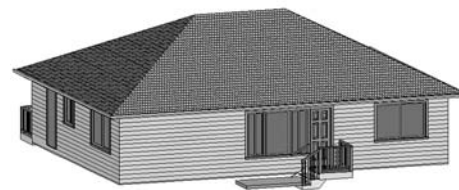
